Editor Responds To A Popular Radio/TV Preacher Who Exclaimed: "Don't let anyone ever tell you that you have to be baptized to be saved."

What do you do when you wake up in the middle of the night and can't go back to sleep? The problem of staying awake at night seems to grow more serious and become more noticeable as we grow older. At least, it has with me. What do we do when we can't sleep? What can we do?

Waking up in the night and experiencing difficulty in going back to sleep, can bring great blessings. I am convinced that sleepless hours provide golden opportunities for spiritual growth. Staying awake during the night can be useful and productive. Sleeplessness is a good time for meditation, recalling scriptures committed to memory. It is a wonderful time to talk to your Heavenly Father, naming and counting your many blessings. Sleepless hours provide a wonderful opportunity to read or listen to the reading of God's word. I have tried them all and found that sleepless night time hours can be very productive.

May I also share with you something else that I often do when I am unable to quickly go back to sleep. I **turn on the radio!** I seek to find the sound of someone preaching and start listening. And, believe or not, *often the preacher puts me to sleep!* (Cheaper than pills.) But on other occasions, the radio preacher keeps me awake; at least, for a while. When awake, I listen and learn. I have benefited greatly from radio sermons heard in the night, preached by men with whom, in some matters, I may strongly disagree.

For example. During the first week of December, very early in the morning, I was listening to a well-known radio/TV preacher. I liked his sermon. He was a talented speaker. His lesson was well prepared. Many things he said needed to be said. They were "right down the line", strictly according to the Bible. His sermon that morning caught my attention. For several minutes I listened. I was impressed and blessed.

Toward the end of his sermon, however, he said some-

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thing that disturbed me greatly. He told about a young man who came up to him one night after he had preached and asked a question about salvation. Specifically, he asked the preacher if baptism was really necessary for salvation.

The popular radio/TV preacher commented about the question and then concluded his response to the young may by stating emphatically, "Baptism is not essential." He

added, "Don't ever let anyone tell you that baptism is necessary for salvation."

Now, I had been drifting in and out of sleep; but, when I heard his statement, "*Don't let anyone tell you*...." I woke up. Wide awake. The radio preacher had just said, "Don't ever let anyone tell you that baptism is necessary for salvation." As I pondered the Bible preacher's *emphatic* and *dogmatic* declaration

that baptism is not necessary for salvation, I couldn't help but to think about some preachers of the first century. I thought about the apostle Peter, the disciple Ananias and Jesus, Himself. What did they have to say about baptism? Did they teach baptism to be necessary?

First: the Apostle Peter. On the day of Pentecost, as Peter preached, he was interrupted by listeners, whose hearts were pricked, as they heard his sermon. They asked, "What shall we do?" The inspired apostle answered, "*Repent and be baptized everyone of you in the name of Jesus Christ, for the remission of sins and you shall receive the gift of the Holy Spirit*" (Acts 2:37,38). Two commands were clearly given by the apostle. **(1)** *Repent* and **(2)** *Be baptized*. Why repent; why be baptized? The answer is clear, "for the remission of sins, so

is baptism! Both acts are required for salvation. The apostle Peter also wrote in his first epistle, "*The like figure whereunto even baptism doeth also now save us, (not the putting away of the filth of the flesh, but the answer of a good conscience toward God), by the resurrection of Jesus Christ*" (1 Peter 3:21). Consider the contrast in the message of preachers. The present day preacher said, "Don't let anyone tell you that baptism is necessary for salvation." The first century preacher said, "Baptism doth also now save us...." It sure sounds like Peter is saying that baptism is necessary for salvation. There is a clear conflict in teaching. Who do you believe? Who will you follow? Will it be the inspired apostle Peter or the popular radio preacher?

Second: the Disciple Ananias. Ananias came to Saul after he had seen the Lord on the road to Damascus and was told to go into the city of Damascus where he would be given further instructions. After three days of praying and fasting, the preacher Ananias came to Saul, asked him

why he was waiting and then commanded, "Arise and be baptized and wash away thy sins, calling on the name of the Lord" (Acts 22:10-16). Again, consider the contrast in the message of preachers. The popular preacher of our day said, "Don't let anyone tell you you have to be baptized." The first century preacher said, "Arise. Be baptized and wash away your sins." It sure sounds like Ananias is saying that baptism is necessary for salvation. There is a clear conflict in teaching. Who do you believe? Who will you follow? Will it be Ananias or the popular radio preacher?

Finally: the Lord Jesus Christ. Jesus commanded his disciples to go into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature. Jesus clearly stated, "He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved; he that believeth not shall be condemned" (Mark 16:15,16). According to Jesus, two actions are required before salvation is promised. They are (1) Faith ["he that believeth"] and (2) Baptism ["and is baptized"]. Once again, consider the contrast in the message of preachers. The popular radio preacher in our day said, "Don't let anyone tell you that baptism is necessary for salvation." The first century preacher, Jesus, the Son of God, promised salvation to those who believe and are baptized. It sure sounds like Jesus is saying that baptism is necessary for salvation. There is a clear conflict in teaching! Who do you believe? Who will you follow. Will it be Jesus or the popular radio preacher?

Paradise." What does the Bible say about Paradise? Is this where the saved reside until Judgment Day? (N.I.)

RESPONSE: The word "Paradise" is an Asian word signifying a beautiful, peaceful garden. The Greek word, paradeisos, is anglicized into "Paradise." Eden is called "Paradise" by the Septuagint translators (Genesis 2:8).

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What the Bible Says about Paradise

The word is used three times in the New Testament. • Jesus told the dying thief, while they were both still on the cross, "Today you will be with me in Paradise" (Luke 23:43).

• Paul talked about a man he said he knew-most commentators think, I believe, correctly, that he was talking about himself-who in a "vision" or "revelation" was caught up into Paradise. "I know a man

in Christ who fourteen years ago was caught up to the third heaven-whether in the body or out of the body I do not know, God knows. And I know that this man was caught up into paradise-whether in the body or out of the body I do not know, God knows- and he

heard things that cannot be told, which man may not utter" (2 Corinthians 12:2-4). Likely, the three heavens referred to are, first, the atmosphere, where the birds fly; second, the heavens where the sun moon and stars are; and third, where God is, which Paul calls Paradise. Elsewhere in Scripture this "third heaven," "Paradise," is called Heaven or, often, "the new heavens and the new earth."

• In Revelation 2:7, Paradise

is used of the antitype of Eden, our ultimate heaven. Jesus promises, "The one who conquers" will "eat of the tree of life, which is in the Paradise of God."

So two of the three times it is used in the New Testament, Paradise is the name of what we call heaven. However, when Jesus told the thief he would that day be with Him in Paradise, He was evidently not speaking of the final destination of the redeemed, the heaven where God is said to

dwell. A few hours later Jesus told Mary Magdalene, "Do not cling to me, for I have not yet ascended to the Father; but go to my brothers and say to them, 'I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God'" (John 20:17). A few days later, after His resurrection,

Peter, in his sermon on Pentecost, quoting from Psalm 16 and applying it to Jesus, said Jesus' soul was "not left in Hades." So the Paradise that Jesus and the thief visited the day of Jesus' crucifixion was not Paul's "the third heaven." It was part of "Hades."

Unfortunately, the King James Version translates both hades and gehenna as "hell," though they are different words with different meanings. All of the dead, whether wicked or righteous, go to hades. It is simply

"the place of the dead," sometimes translated "the grave." Gehenna, is "hell," the final destination of the unredeemed, "the hell of fire" (Matthew 5:22).

Much of our information about Hades come from Jesus' account of Lazarus and the rich man as recorded in Luke 16:19-31:

There was a rich man who was clothed in purple and fine linen and who feasted sumptuously every day. And at his gate was laid a poor man named Lazarus, covered with sores, who desired to be fed with what fell from the rich man's table. Moreover, even the dogs came and licked his sores. The poor man died and was carried by the angels to Abraham's side. The rich man also died and was buried, and in Hades, being in torment, he lifted up his eyes and saw Abraham far off and Lazarus at his side. And he called out. "Father Abraham, have mercy on me, and send Lazarus to dip the end of his finger in water and cool my tongue, for I am in anguish in this flame." But Abraham said, "Child, remember that you in your lifetime received your good things, and Lazarus in like manner bad things; but now he is comforted here, and you are in anguish. And besides all this, between us and you a great chasm has been fixed, in order that those who would pass from here to you may not be able, and none may cross from there to us." And he said, "Then I beg you, father, to send him to my father's house—for I have five brothers —so that he may warn them, lest they also come into this

place of torment." But Abraham said, "They have Moses and the Prophets; let them hear them." And he said, "No, father Abraham, but if someone goes to them from the dead, they will repent." He said to him, "If they do not hear Moses and the Prophets, neither will they be convinced if someone should rise from the dead."

Some immediately say, "That is just a parable. It does not tell us anything about the reality of life after death." However, it is probably not a parable. If it is, it is the only one in which one of the characters is given a name. Even if it is a parable, though, Jesus told "parables," not "fables." Parables are consistent with reality. I believe Jesus' account of Lazarus and the rich man, whether a parable or not, gives a limited but accurate picture of life immediately after death and, apparently, before the resurrection. Resurrection to a new, glorious, incorruptible, immortal, spiritual body occurs at the second coming (1 Corinthians 15:22-23).

Is Paradise Where the Saved Reside until Judgment Day?

It seems so. Again, we are relying on Jesus' account of Lazarus and the rich man for most of our information about this. In that account, life on earth is continuing and the second coming, resurrection and judgment have not occurred, although the

characters obviously know their eternal destinies. They recognize one another and converse, but, presumably, do not yet have their spiritual, resurrection bodies.

So when faithful Christians die, they go to Hades, the place of all the dead, and are in a state of bliss, Paradise. Some speak as if the place is called "Abraham's bosom," but Lazarus is simply reclining at a table with his head close to Abraham's chest. ESV correctly translates, "was carried by the angels to Abraham's side." When unredeemed wicked people, like the rich man, die, they also go to Hades, but they are "in torment."

Judgment, then, is not so much the revealing of people's final destiny as it is an announcement of it.

This scenario, at death going from earth to Hades and then, at the second coming and judgment, to Heaven or hell, is the announced view of many of the Bible students and preachers whom I most respect and trust, including G.C. Brewer, Jack P. Lewis and Guy N. Woods. It is what I have believed and preached for many years. However, I am beginning to have second thoughts. What if God operates in eternity, outside of time restraints? What if, then, the fact that one thing occurs before another in time, has no meaning or relevance to God or to how things are in eternity? I am still "just thinking." I may develop this further in a later column (CM,Jr.).

Where Is Paradise?

As noted above, two of the three times "Paradise" appears in Scripture, it is referring to heaven, the final destiny of the redeemed. However, Christ told the dying thief, "Today you will

Learning to Adapt in Mission Work **A Bible Camp in Lithuania**

It has been almost 20 years since a group of mainly Mississippi Christians traveled to a country they had never heard of before in an effort to conduct a youth camp. Nineteen ninety-eight was our first year for church camp in the former Soviet Union country of Lithuania. Neither the children nor the Lithuanian adults who attended knew guiet what to expect.

Danny Dodd, now of Arkansas and Bud Myer, now of Florida envisioned a camp modeled after Sardis Lake Christian Camp in north Mississippi. Danny met with his long time staff members of SLCC and invited them to go and embark on this wild plan to conduct a youth camp in Lithuania.

For several years the Waterview church in Dallas, Texas had traveled to Lithuania to conduct "door knocking" campaigns, a tool used by many churches here in America. The door knocking campaign did not go over as well in Lithuania and future efforts were not planned. That is when Bud Myer, whose sister attended the Waterview church shared the news with

her brother. Bud and Danny traveled to Lithuania a couple of times to investigate and possibly set the plans in the works.

During our first year, confused and bewildered looks were all over the faces of the children as we tried to sing "Jesus Loves Me" in a language they were not very familiar with. "Get your elbows off the table" fell flat too as they children looked at us like we were crazy. But as each day and each year passed they grew more to trust us and began opening up to us.

Our first session, we had a rule for the late night

devotional where you had to hug at least a certain number of people prior to going to bed. That first year the hugs were all one sided as the Lithuanian youth stood stiff not knowing what to do. This year, the last night, the rule was for 20 hugs and without exception, everyone violated that rule by more than doubling that number.

Now almost 20 years later, nearly every person there understands English quiet well and for the past couple of years three sessions of camp have taken place. Matt Bell of the Pensacola church in Florida directs a session primarily geared to young children. Paul Franks of Kosciusko directs a session for teen agers and Danny Dodd of Little Rock directs the last session geared to families and missionaries.

Campers for the first year are now returning as counselors and this time, bringing along their own children. Families are coming from England, the Netherlands, Russia, and even as far away as India to attend the Family Camp session.

Scores of Lithuanians have come to know the Lord

more through the efforts of the sessions at Camp Ruta. When the European Union came into effect some years ago, travel for the youth of Lithuania now was much easier and getting out of their home country was now their objective. The church suffered because of this, but we know that our efforts were now going all over the EU. One of the most difficult facts we were faced with was knowing that many of the cities and towns "our" youth were going to did not have churches in them. But we planted the seed and pray that someone will water them and then the harvest will be made later.

One of the reasons this work has been highly successful is that campers love the week, but their lives are changed and improved and their parents see that change when they come home. Parents have appreciated what we do for their children and some outreach is being made with them as well. Plans start taking place almost on the day camp ends. There is so much excitement for both Lithuanians and Americans in participating in the spreading of God's word in this effort. All glory is given to God for this wonderful work. "While still a young man, the tide of popular opinion turned against him. His friends ran away. One of them denied Him. He was turned over to His enemies. He went through the mockery of a trial. He was nailed upon a cross between two thieves. While He was dying His executioners gambled for the only piece of property He had on earth – His coat. When He was dead, He was laid in a borrowed grave through the pity of a friend.

"Nineteen long centuries have come and gone, and today He is a centerpiece of the human race and leader of the column of progress. I am far within the mark when I say that all the armies that ever marched, all the navies that were ever built; all the parliaments that ever sat and all the kings that ever reigned, put together, have not affected the life of man upon this earth as powerfully as has that one solitary life."

SEASONED WITH SALT; NOT SALTY LANGUAGE

Elections have always been marked by a certain amount of ugliness. It seems hard for two people to square off in a bid for political office without som e name-calling and mud-slinging. It appears nearly impossible for candidates to deal solely with the issues at stake.

But by the same token, there is validity to asking the voters to consider the moral and spiritual life of the one they are about to put in office, making it very difficult to keep from offending supporters on one side or the other.

The foregoing facts have prompted me to put together a few thoughts that could be helpful to all of us, no matter your political preference or pedigree.

It is abundantly clear to all by now that the very fiber of our beloved America has undergone drastic changes in

recent times. Our recent presidential race has brought things to light that have caught most of us off guard and resulted in needless injury to the feelings of patriotic Americans, good citizens, some of whom are our Christian family.

Please understand that I'm including myself here as I write. Only recently I posted a politics-related item on Facebook that to me seemed humorous. However, I failed to take into account that some good people in my

acquaintance felt otherwise. I was soundly—and rightfully—chastised for it. I offered my sincere apology and have learned from the experience. It taught me that I still have not mastered the art of carefully weighing my words before turning them loose like pellets from a scatter gun. I learned that what may be humorous to me doesn't always come across that way to others. I learned that one careless statement can hurt my image among those I care about. Like many of you, I have struggled all my life to control my tone of voice and choose the right words—grace-filled, loving words of truth. Being graceful to others has always been a challenge, so please be patient with me for I do want to grow in this grace also.

It became apparent during this last election that people in general have become super-sensitive. It would be difficult to isolate the cause or causes of this. Some of what I saw reminded me of our children when they were growing up. We would get in the car and would drive no more than 5 miles before one of them was whining, "He touched me." "She's looking at me." "Tell him to scoot over." You wondered if they knew they were members of the same family! Where was their tolerance for one another? Had they not heard ANYthing we tried to teach them?

But having said that, it still remains that as fellow Americans—to say nothing about being Christians—we must "Consider how we may spur one another on toward love and good deeds." (Hebrews 10:24), or "Let your conversation be always full of grace, seasoned with salt...." (Colossians 4:6) It calls for great tact when asking another to consider certain things in a political platform that may run counter to Christian principles, without leaving

the impression that he has to be a member of a certain political party before he can be, or remain, a Christian.

It has become painfully apparent that in some quarters damage has been done to Christian relationships and between neighbors because of words carelessly or thoughtlessly spoken. Let us resolve to do all we can to promote good will. Feelings about this election will continue to be raw for some time to come. There is no doubt that our beloved country is

reeling in the wake cutting words and hate-filled crimes. We have a lot of work to do in rebuilding the moral fiber of our culture. But there is still so much good in this land that needs to be highlighted. We can still live in peace with nearly all of our neighbors.

I want to pass on to our readers some words of wisdom by Dr. Ben Carson: "While much of America seems to be getting more and more divisive, I'm going to be holding doors for strangers, letting people cut in front of me in traffic, greeting all I meet, exercising patience with others, and smiling at strangers. I'll do this as often as I have the opportunity. I will not stand idly by and let children live in a world where unconditional love is invisible and being rude is acceptable. Join me in showing love and respect to others. Find your way to swing the pendulum in the direction of love. Because today, sadly, hate is gaining ground. Love must begin somewhere and love will overcome hate. Imagine the difference if we each purposefully love a little more."

A few suggestions on implementing these measures:

1. Be extremely careful what you post on Facebook or in other social media. There's simply no need to unnecessarily hurt others by "rubbing it in" on any level.

2. Think twice before speaking too frankly within hearing distance of strangers; they may totally misinterpret your words.

3. Watch for opportunities to open a conversation with those of other races; expressing the hope that you can do your little bit toward eliminating hatred and bitterness, and promoting unity.

4. Go the second mile to show others the spirit of Christ. 5. Anonymously pay for someone's coffee or sandwich in the car behind you at McDonalds or Starbucks (ok, so you might want to make sure they don't have six kids in the car!).

You get the idea. As Christian people, let's start a movement to see just how much good will we can build in our communities. God has listed for us the fruit of the Spirit and it is so simple: "...love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control....' (Galatians 5:22). These are the qualities that can make peace and they are the very qualities that are in such short supply. He also said, "If it is possible, as far as it depends on you, live at peace with everyone." (Romans 12:18)

It has to start somewhere.

The ladies of Huntsville church of Christ, French Camp, MS, hosted Ladies' Day September 17, 2016. Our theme for the day was "Heart Exam!"

It was a wonderful day, beginning with a light breakfast, followed by our Ladies' Day program, and ending with lunch. Our keynote speaker, Celine Sparks, explained that the scriptures should be our guide when we examine our hearts to determine if we are spiritually healthy.

Celine chose several scriptures which illustrated the theme; however, 1 Samuel 16:7 said it best:

"But the LORD said unto Samuel, Look not on his countenance, or on the height of his stature; because I have refused him: for the LORD seeth not as man seeth; for man looketh on the outward appearance, but the LORD looketh on the heart"

(1 Samuel 16:7).

Celine began her presentation with an effective illustration showing that, when compared to the number of U.S. war causalities, the number of deaths by abortions is astounding. She pointed out that people do not call "*sin*" "**sin**" any more. We change the names of the sins that Jesus condemned in the scriptures to make them sound more appealing, by using such words as a "*choice*" and "*mature*" audience. Changing the name does not lessen the sin; it weakens our hearts.

In her presentation, Celine discussed many characteristics of a spiritually healthy heart, including commitment (Romans 6:17), determination (Philippians 4:13), compassion (Colossians 3:12), forgiving (Ephesians 4:32), and loving (1 Peter 3:8). When the LORD looks on our hearts, He expects to see these and other characteristics.

A person with a spiritually healthy heart, committed foremost to God and to His teachings, will study the scriptures daily for His instructions. Someone with a forgiving, determined, and compassionate heart, who serves the LORD, knows that compassion should include everyone -- not only our close friends, but also acquaintances, and others in our number who may be sick or hindered to the point of being unable to attend services.

Jesus said, when asked what the greatest commandment is, "Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy mind. This is the first and great commandment. And the second is like unto it, Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself. On these

two commandments hang all the law and the prophets" (Matthew 22:36-40).

A loving heart is a forgiving heart. To be a strong faithful follower of Christ, Celine showed that we should have a heart exam daily to be sure we are committed, determined, compassionate, forgiving, and loving. Solomon said, "As a man thinketh in his heart, so is he"

(Proverbs 23:7). Jesus added to this by saying, "Out of the abundance of

the heart the mouth speaketh" (Matthew 12:34). Therefore, a person's speech is a good indicator of his or her heart condition. Does our speech reveal a good spiritual heart? One's spiritual heart is as important to a spiritual life as is one's physical heart to one's physical life.

Buster was a successful basketball coach, with champion teams at IJC 1962-1975. Does God Give the Same Role to Women that He Gives to Men?

Editor's Note: The following lesson, by Phil Sanders, was presented on "In Search of the Lord's Way" TV program. It was seen in central Mississippi on Sunday, July 12, 2015. We are very grateful for the excellent scriptural presentation and for permission given to us to publish in the MM. (alf)

In the beginning God created us male and female. He made us in His image and in His likeness. But does God give the same role to women that He gives to men? Let's explore the role of women in the church.

God said in Isaiah 55 verses 8 to 9, "For My thoughts are not your thoughts, nor are your ways My ways,' declares the LORD. 'For as the heavens are higher than the earth, so are My ways higher than your ways, And My thoughts than your thoughts." God's ways are not always our ways, but God's ways are always right. We may not understand God's ways or even agree with them, but God's wisdom far exceeds our own and, through time, God's wisdom proves right every time. So we follow the One who is utterly trustworthy. Psalm 19 verse 9 says, "The judgments of the LORD are true; they are righteous altogether."

Where in the world would any of us be without the women in our lives? They are indeed precious in so many ways and a blessing to the church. I've been blessed with a godly mother who has passed and has gone

to be

with the Lord, I now have a faithful and loving wife for more than forty years, with four precious daughters who are all well-educated and very talented. I also have eleven delightful granddaughters. Well, do I care about all the females in my life? Of course I do! I want every good thing for them and want them to serve God and to go to heaven.

The best thing that you can do is to love and serve God faithfully and to help others to love and serve God. Obeying God is an act of love. The Lord Jesus said in John 14 verse 15, that "If you love Me, you will keep My commandments." If you want to bless your family, lead them in loving the Lord. Lead them to love the Lord in every way. Don't pick which laws you like and ignore the others. We are to "observe all things" that Jesus commands us. And this touches every aspect of our lives.

Our reading comes from 1 Corinthians chapter 14, verses 33 to 37. "For God is not a God of confusion but of peace, as in all the churches of the saints. The women are to keep silent in the churches; for they are not permitted to speak, but are to subject themselves, just as the Law also says.

If they desire to learn anything, let them ask their own husbands at home; for it is improper for a woman to speak in church. Was it from you that the word of God first went forth? Or has it come to you only? If anyone thinks he is a prophet or spiritual, let him recognize that the things which I write to you are the Lord's commandment."

When God created Adam and Eve, He created the male first and the female later. God created her to be a "helper fit for him" (Genesis 2 and verse 18). 1 Corinthians 11 and verse 9 says, "for indeed man was not created for the woman's sake, but woman for the man's sake." Now the distinctive roles the Scriptures place on men and women are not cultural traditions of bygone eras but God's plan for humans made in His image.

When Adam and Eve sinned in the garden, God said to the woman in Genesis 3 and verse 16, "I will greatly multiply your pain in childbirth, and in pain you will bring forth children; Yet your desire will be for your husband, And he will rule over you." This declaration from the beginning applies to God's order in the home and in the church. This is God's declaration for all time.

Now God's word, thousands of years later, says in I Corinthians 11 and verse 3, "But I want you to know that the head of every man is Christ, the head of woman is man, and the head of Christ is God."

> Now some have assumed that because man is the head of woman, that this makes women inferior to men. The relationship, however, between Christ and the Father is like the relationship of woman to man; consequently, being in subjection

does not mean being less than equal. Paul said the Lord Jesus was equal with the Father but took the form of a servant in the book of Philippians chapter 2 verses 5 to 8. Just because a woman is to be in subjection to a man does not make her less than him. Any man who treats women with disrespect is failing as a Christian.

When the Lord chose people to lead and teach the church, Christ chose men. The twelve apostles were all men, not six men and six women. The seven servants chosen to feed the Grecian widows in Acts 6 were all men. When the Scripture lays down the qualifications for elders and deacons in 1

Timothy 3 verses 1 to 14, they are required to be husbands. Now the absence of females in this matter is no accident.

The Scripture gives women in the New Testament various, praiseworthy roles of teaching and service. Women may evangelize privately as Priscilla and Aquilla did with Apollos in Acts 18:26.

Philippians 4:2 to 3 describes Euodia and Syntyche as fellow-laborers with Paul in the gospel. Paul instructed older women in Titus 2 verses 3 to 4 to teach and to train the younger women to love their husbands and their children.

Acts 9 and verse 36 describes Dorcas as a woman "full of good works and acts of charity (or kindness)." Some

women had spiritual gifts. Acts 21 verse 9 says that Philip, the evangelist, had four daughters who prophesied. Women were the first at the tomb of Jesus, and the Lord sent them to tell the apostles of His resurrection. Women often traveled with Jesus and His disciples and supported His ministry.

Faithful Christian men should treat their wives with honor and respect. 1 Peter 3 and verse 7 says, that "You husbands in the same way, live with your wives in an understanding way, as with someone weaker, since she is a woman; and show her honor as a fellow heir of the grace of life, so that your prayers will not be hindered." When men treat women with disrespect, it's clear that this behavior hinders their prayers to God. Godly men honor women; ungodly men mistreat them.

The New Testament, however, limits the roles women may play in the assembled church and in the leadership of the church. The Bible says in 1 Corinthians 14 verses 33 to 37, "as in all the churches of the saints. The women are to keep silent in the churches; for they are not permitted to speak, but are to subject themselves, just as the Law also says. If they desire to learn anything, let them ask their own husbands at home; for it is improper for a woman to speak in church. Was it from you that the word of God first went forth? Or has it come to you only? If anyone thinks he is a prophet or spiritual, let him recognize that the things which I write to you are the Lord's commandment." It is clear women are not to speak to the whole church to impart teaching.

Paul gives four reasons for this restriction on women.

First, the Law says this. It may refer to Genesis 3:16, as noted earlier, or it could be that the female's subordination is due to the sin in the garden. It possibly could come from man's priority in the creation. The Bible says, "Then the rib

which the LORD God had taken from man, He made into a woman, and He brought her to the man" (Genesis 2 and verse 22). Numbers 30 verses 3 to 12 also notes that a woman's vow must be approved either by her father or by her husband; and, if he opposes the vow, then her pledge will not stand.

Second, "it is shameful for women (not just wives) to speak in church" (1 Corinthians 14 and verse 35). "Church" here refers to the assembled body as in I Corinthians 11 and verse 18. Paul calls the act of a woman speaking in church "shameful" or

"disgraceful." While some hold that culture is the source of the shame, it likely means this shame, instead, arises from "God" and his Law. In fact, the pagan cults of both Corinth and Ephesus had women as their high priestesses and teachers, according to Bruce Morton in his book, Deceiving Winds. The Lord's commandment was actually counter to the pagan culture of Corinth! God's teaching came to change the world; and we must not let the world change the church.



Third, "Let your women keep silent in the churches." Mmm, plural. This practice was not merely to be kept in Corinth, but in all of the churches of Christ across the way. They were to "keep silent." And this phrase "keep silent" is from the Greek

word sigao, which means to hold one's peace and say nothing. The instruction to "keep silent" is given three times in this chapter. First, a tongue speaker (even if he was a male) is to "keep silent" when no interpreter is present (verse 28). Second, if one prophet is speaking and another receives a revelation, "the first one must keep silent" (verses 29 to 30). And third, he says "Let your women keep silent in the churches, for they are not permitted to speak" (verse 34). Now "speaking" here is a general term which would apply to public talk: that is leading prayer, and preaching, and prophesying, tongue-speaking or interpreting, they were not to do that.



Fourth, Paul says this is "the commandment of the Lord" (chapter 14 verse 37). Some gifted Christians likely objected to Paul's instructions, so Paul boldly declares the source of this "commandment" is the Lord himself. There's nothing

cultural or temporary about the Lord's command to the churches. Some object, "Well what about the women who were praying and prophesying in 1 Corinthians 11 verses 4 to 7" Well the primary subject of chapter 11 has to do with wearing veils and not the speaking in church. The "custom" or practice of the day was for women to have long hair and wear a veil. Breaking this custom was, in that day, "disgraceful" and against nature. Now some gifted women may have thought that their spiritual gifts gave them the right to speak in the assembled church. If the women were speaking in the assembled church in chapter 11, Paul eventually tells them to stop it in chapter 14. Women likely spoke in other settings than the assembled church, such as gatherings of women or in private. Whatever the case, the command of the Lord was to end the practice of women speaking in the assembled churches as a whole.

Now we have this teaching confirmed in 1 Timothy chapter 2. Paul said in 1 Timothy 2 and verse 8, "I desire then that in every place, (that is in every place of worship), the men should pray, lifting holy hands without anger or quarreling." Now Paul chose "men (that is adult males) in every place to pray."

The phrase "in every place" is a specific term, a technical term speaking of the place where congregations assembled to worship. 1 Corinthians 1 and verse 2 uses the term to describe the place where the church assembled. Clearly, God wanted males to take the lead in prayer and worship.

If women are not permitted to lead prayer, surely they are also forbidden to preach. Women are to learn in quietness, and not teach! 1 Timothy 2 verses 11 to 12 says, "Let a woman learn in silence with all submission. And I do not permit a woman to teach or to have authority over a man,

but to be in silence." Now asserting his apostolic authority, Paul did not permit women to be public teachers of men or to exercise authority over a man at church. She cannot rule or subjugate men to her will at church. Paul does not permit her to take these roles, even if elders, preachers, and other men allow it, God does not. No person has a right to ask or to permit any female to do what is contrary to God's instructions.

To be quiet or silent (it's the Greek word hesuchia) here means to be at rest, a spirit and an attitude of tranquility arising from within so that she causes no disturbance. They were to focus on learning not teaching and to remain quiet, to say nothing. This learning was to take place with "entire submissiveness." Now "entire submissiveness," is a complete, voluntary surrender of one's rights or will. It is to give precedence to others; she is to "subordinate herself in every respect." This is not speaking merely of subjection to her husband; this is speaking broadly of women subjecting themselves to the leadership of men in the functions of the church. "Submission" does not mean that one is inferior, or has inferior value or worth but rather that one recognizes one's role in a relationship. As we noted, Jesus was not inferior to God according to Philippians 2 verse 5 to 8, but he willfully subjected himself to his Father.

Now the theological basis for saying women cannot preach arises from the beginning with Adam and Eve, not a cultural bias from Paul himself. "For Adam was formed first, 1 Timothy 2 says, then Eve. Adam was not deceived, but the woman being deceived, fell into transgression." (I Timothy 2 verses 13 to 14). You see, this teaching reveals God's order of life, God's way.

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According to historian Everett Ferguson, the writers in the early church history gave evidence that "Women were not appointed as elders, nor did they take public speaking roles in the assembly as prophets, teachers, or leaders in the assembly. Where women did take these roles in some of the heretical and schismatic groups, this practice was a basis for objection to these groups." While times change and cultures change, God's word, God's Bible does not change.

We should use our talents for the Lord, but we shouldn't assume that talents permit us to engage in activities and roles that God never meant for us. Now King Saul was not a priest and he sinned when he presumptuously made a burnt offering at Gilgal, rather than waiting for the high priest Samuel to come (and that's found in 1 Samuel 13 verses 8 to 14). And even though he was king, Saul had no right to make this sacrifice. By presuming that he could act without authority, Saul lost his place with God. You remember King Uzziah also became proud and transgressed against the LORD by "entering the temple of the Lord to burn incense on the altar of incense" (2 Chronicles 26 and verse 16). Now Uzziah was not a Levite, so Azariah the priest and eighty others rightly withstood him. God punished Uzziah for his sin. God will not let an unmarried or childless man be an elder either. So it's not a matter of gender, it's a matter of qualifications.

Even Jesus, as the Son of God, could not serve as a Levitical priest in the temple because He was from the tribe of Judah (Hebrews 7 and verse 14). You see, Jesus didn't feel cheated because he couldn't function as a Levitical priest in the temple. You see, giftedness does not grant the right to overrule God's laws. The Scriptures demand that anyone who leads must meet the qualifications. And so, rather than feeling cheated over what we aren't permitted to do, we should focus on the things that we can and should do to serve God. And so with joy and thanksgiving let's follow His will and not our own.

Someone objects, "Well isn't being limited unfair to women?" The answer to that question is no. God has given women marvelous roles in virtually every other area than in the leadership of the church. God has given women some roles that men will never be able to fill. Should men object and feel cheated? Well the answer is no. Our task is to pursue the work that God has given us to the best of our ability rather than envy what God has given to someone else. In God's eyes, every member of the body, that is the church, is valuable though they have different functions.

1 Corinthians 12 verses 14 to 19 says, "For the body {that is the church} is not one member, but many. And if the foot says, 'Because I am not a hand, I am not a part of the body,'it's not for this reason any the less a part of the body. And if the ear says, 'Because I am not an eye, I am not a part of the body,'it's not for this reason any the less a part of the body. If the whole body were an eye, where would the hearing be? If the whole were hearing, where would the sense of smell be? But now God has placed the members, each one of them, in the body, just as He desired. If they were all one member, where would the body be?" Yes, God has a place and a purpose for every single one!

Please let Jesus be Lord of your life. Trust His ways; they are higher than our ways. Believe in the Lord Jesus, turn from sin and selfishness to serve Him, confess Jesus Christ as the Son of God, and be baptized. Baptism is an immersion in water in the name of Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of sins. And when you're baptized, God washes away your sins and makes you His child. Oh become a Christian today!

What the Bible Says about Paradise

be with me in Paradise" (Luke 23:43), and Peter, a few days later, said, "He was not abandoned to Hades, nor did his flesh see corruption" (Acts 2:31). So the Paradise Jesus mentioned on the cross is part of Hades, with the other part involving "torment" and "flames."

The word "Tartarus" occurs just once in Scripture and some versions, including the ESV, translate it "hell:" "for if God did not spare angels when they sinned, but cast them into hell and committed them to chains of gloomy darkness to be kept until the judgment" (2 Peter 2:4). Many have applied that term to where the rich man was in Hades, "in torment." In that case, Hades is seen as divided into two compartments, "Paradise" and "Tartarus."

The Rest of the Questions

Some of these questions, but not all, are specifically addressed in the account of Lazarus and the Rich Man.

"What do you think the spirits do there? Can they see across the great gulf? Can they speak to others in Abraham's bosom? Can they speak to those they may know where the rich man is?"

Unlike heaven, where the redeemed are portrayed as singing, serving and praising God, nothing is said about how the spirits in Hades spend their time. That is true, just because it is not germane to the point Jesus is making. Abraham and the rich man could see each other and converse across the great gulf or huge chasm. However, Abraham said there could be no passing from one place to the other. It is an unanswered question whether the rich man talking to Abraham was a special case or whether they could converse generally across the chasm to just anyone.

"Do they sing praises to God? Do they receive blessings from God?"

Jesus does not address that in Luke. Paul does say, "My desire is to depart and be with Christ, for that is far better" (Philippians 1:23). Somehow the Christian's situation right after death is "far better" than here on earth. To depart and be with Christ" seems to imply an immediate "being with Christ" and blessings received at death. Christ, of course, like God, is omnipresent, everywhere at the same time. We will receive blessings and sing God's praises in heaven. That may be true as well in Hades.

"Do they know others around them? Are they aware that their loved ones are back on earth, like family, wives and children? Can they anticipate their joining them sometime?"

Both Lazarus and the rich man knew Abra-

ham, so, yes. The rich man remembered his brothers back on earth and was concerned about them. However, there is no indication he could communicate with them or that he could know what they are doing while he is in Hades. One of our fondest hopes is rejoining our redeemed loved ones in heaven. Do those who have gone on have the same expectation for those still behind? As far as I know, the Bible does not address that, but it seems likely. A spiritual song says, "If you get there before I do, tell all my friends I'm coming too."

Will my husband know me when I arrive there as his wife?

I am certain we will know each other in heaven, and apparently the same is true in this intermediate Hades stage. David said concerning his dead child, "I can go to him, but he cannot return to me" (2 Samuel 23). That makes no sense unless David would know the child. Jesus said, "I tell you, many will come from east and west and recline at table with Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob in the kingdom of heaven" (Matthew 8:11). Again, that surely means we will recognize Abraham, Isaac and Jacob. The conversation Jesus had with the Sadducees not only implies that Abraham, Isaac and Jacob are "living," it also implies the resurrection, not just the continuance of the soul or life principal. Abraham, Isaac and Jacob will have a "spiritual" but still recognizable "body." They are not only still alive; they are still Abraham, Isaac and Jacob (Matthew 22:29-32).

Jesus says, "For in the resurrection they neither marry nor are given in marriage, but are like angels in heaven" (Matthew 22:30). Our spiritual bodies, no longer "flesh and blood" (1 Corinthians 15:50), will not have carnal appetites; we will have no capacity or desire for sex or food. We will still know, and love, our life-long companions, but the exclusive "one flesh" relationship we have with them on earth will not be in heaven. We will know them, and we will not love them less; we will just love others in heaven more.

Will he still have dementia?

No. Dementia is a terrible disease, especially for the loved ones and caregivers of the one afflicted. For certain, nothing like that will be in heaven and, presumably, not in the Paradise of Hades! Our "incorruptible," "immortal," "glorious" resurrection bodies will not be subject to death or any kind of disease or deterioration. We are not told what the resurrection bodies will look like. To me "spirit" and "body" are opposite things; so I cannot mentally grasp "spiritual body." But I do not have to understand it to believe it. I believe it "for the Bible tells me so."

Conclusion

Not, I presume, today, but one day, I pray that Jesus will say to all of us, "You will be with me in Paradise." STILL GROWS!

Many who read these words may experience God's kingdom/church as a local body of believers that is *small in number and on a track that offers limited prospects for real growth.* In fact, many local churches are looking at *declining numbers* and *diminishing resources* in the future unless matters change. Such a realistic view is necessary if God's people are to do all they can to be faithful and to work for a reversal of trends. But focusing only on the local church's apparent decline can be very discouraging and cause even the faithful to become discouraged.

We need to remember that no matter how small or plagued with problems, if we are a church that truly belongs to Christ, we are serving a great God and King



whose kingdom grows! In one sense, because God rules over all the earth (Psalm 103: 19), his kingdom is complete and cannot be expanded. But in the sense

of God's redemptive kingdom on earth (Matthew 16: 18, 19), where he rules in the hearts of men and women as he saves them, that kingdom is ever growing! Three of Jesus' short parables help put that growth in perspective for us.

The Seed Growing of Itself.

The Seed Growing of Itself. The first parable we want to consider is largely overlooked by many Christians, unless they are making an extensive study of Jesus' parables or of the Gospel of Mark. Tucked away in Mark Chapter 4 is a brief, but encouraging parable that clearly teaches us that God makes his kingdom grow. "And He said, "The kingdom of God is as if a man should scatter seed on the ground, and should sleep by night and rise by day, and the seed should sprout and grow, he himself does not know how.

But let us also know that the kingdom is much, much larger than a local church. It is much, much larger than all of the American churches of Christ. God's kingdom reaching into all the world continues to spread and grow wherever his gospel has gone. Its growth is certain.

For the earth yields crops by itself: first the blade, after that the head, after that the full grain in the head. But when the grain ripens, immediately he puts in the sickle, because the harvest has come" (Vv. 26 - 29 New King James Version).

Men and women of God must do their part, for sure, sowing the seed of the kingdom which is the word of God (here as in the Parable of the Sower – Luke 8: 11). But God makes the seed grow and ultimately brings a harvest (1 Corinthians 3: 6, 7). Much of God's powerful work in lives is unseen until near time for harvest, but the kingdom is still growing while it moves to visible expression in souls saved, added, and changed. There is a lot more to kingdom growth than the day of harvest which is, of course, it goal.

The Hidden Leaven.

The Hidden Leaven. "Another parable He spoke to them: 'The kingdom of heaven is like leaven, which a woman took and hid in three measures of meal till it was all leavened" (Matthew 13: 33). Among other lessons from this short teaching is the truth that God's kingdom grows as those transferred into the kingdom (Colossians 1: 13) and transformed by it (Ephesians 4: 22 - 24) contact all around them. Wherever disciples alive in Christ are in all parts of the world, there the transforming work of God goes on.

A lot of the growth is unseen for a while (hidden in the meal or buried underground as in the previous parable), but it is reaching in every direction shaping the world. To focus only on the immediate visible progress of some is to miss the larger picture of a world being changed from the inside out by the power of our God. Those we touch with authentic faith will touch others we will never see, and they will touch others. Live the life, be the influence in word and deed, and know that kingdom growth is underway. The transformation of many we influence may not be fully evident for a long time and in circumstances where we no longer will see them. The here and now is not the full picture of kingdom growth.

The Mustard Seed.

The Mustard Seed. Matthew 13: 31, 32 says, "Another parable He put forth to them, saying, "The kingdom of heaven is like a mustard seed, which a man took and sowed in his field, which is the least of all seeds; but when it is grown, it is greater than the herbs, and becomes a tree, so that birds of the air come and nest in its branches." The main point of the parable is to assure believers that the growth of God's kingdom will ultimately be majestic and great, far greater than its meager beginnings would indicate. From microscopic seed to majestic tree (bush) several feet tall!

What an image of the growing kingdom of God! We are a part of God's work that has a marvelous future. The kingdom of God keeps going and growing, spreading and reaching upward in the sight of God. At the end of God's great work, voices in heaven will say, "The kingdom of the world has become the kingdom of our Lord and of his Christ, and he shall reign forever and ever" (Revelation 11: 15 ESV). Amen!

When it seems that our enemy Satan is thwarting the growth of God's kingdom where we live and serve, let us work hard to overcome that. But let us also know that the kingdom is much, much larger than a local church. It is much, much larger than all of the American churches of Christ. God's kingdom reaching into all the world continues to spread and grow wherever his gospel has gone. Its growth is certain.

As the beloved song urges us, let us keep on "sowing the seed of the kingdom, brother" because we know at the end of the way, at the end of the day, there is "a harvest pure and bright". I want to see that astounding harvest and be a part of it. How about you?

A well known politician recently was heard to say, "Don't ever touch alcohol or drugs; then you won't ever become addicted." Isn't that true? Now, you may think you would never become addicted, but you could very well be. The stakes are high!

We also need to consider our influence on when engaging in the use of alcohol. You may not be become addicted yourself; but, your example could influence someone else to become enslaved. Today's social media gives the impression that to be accepted, drinking is a necessity. This is a lie of the devil. Numerous are the recipes for mixed drinks and margaritas that are constantly posted on Facebook. Just think of all the lives that have been ruined by the use of alcohol, the marriages that have been broken up, the crimes that have been committed and the lives that have been lost due to the influence of alcohol. Remember, our question is, "What do you have to lose by not ever touching it? You certainly would not have to face so many of the difficulties associated with the use of alcohol. You would have much to gain by not ever touching or tasting alcohol.

Example ILLICIT SEX No. 2

The devil is deceitful in convincing the multitudes that one of

the main ways to enjoy life is by engaging in illicit sexual conduct (fornication and adultery). We see example after example of great heartache suffered because of bad decisions to go outside the boundaries set by God. The Bible states: "Marriage is honorable in all and the bed undefiled, but fornicators and adulterers God will judge (Heb. 13:4). God's rules/laws are not designed to hurt us. They are for our benefit. When we obey God, we are not only a *better people*, we are a *happier people!* Even if God's Word were not God's word; (but, of course, we know that it is); we would still be a much better and happier people by following Bible teachings.

Now it is true, that even faithful Christians sin at times and experience difficulties, but they don't have the problems of those who continue the practice of sin. The Bible teaches that, for those who repent and walk in the light, God forgives all sin. "But if we walk in the light, as he is in the light, we have fellowship one with another, and the blood of Jesus Christ his Son cleanseth us from all sin." (I John 1:7) Think about it: What do you have to lose by living a good moral life? No doubt, you enjoy a better life now; but,

remember: This earthly life is not all there is to it. The Bible says, "It is appointed unto men once to die but after this the judgment..." (Hebrews 9: 27).

In addition to living a good moral life, there are definite steps that must be taken in preparation for the Judgment and/or death. As the apostle Peter was preaching the first gospel sermon (on the day of Pentecost, recorded in Acts 2), many were pricked in their hearts and cried out, "What must we do?" Peter replied, "Repent and baptized everyone one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins: and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Ghost." (Acts 2:37,38). Those who evidenced their faith, through obedience, were added to the Lord's church. Holy Scripture teaches that Jesus is the Saviour of the church which is his body" (See Ephesians 5:23). By becoming a Christian and living a Christ-like life, you have everything to gain. Have you obeyed the gospel plan of salvation? Are you in Christ, His church, His body? Are you living a good moral life? You have nothing of real value to lose by living and dying in Christ; instead you have everything of real and lasting value to gain.

Recipes For Our Readers

We have had several requests through the years to make recipes available through the pages of the Magnolia Messenger. We have included a recipe in this issue that many have requested. Since I cannot remember who gave me the recipe and it has no name on it, I cannot give proper credit for it. It is one of my favorite dessert recipes and is my most requested recipe. We sure hope that you will enjoy this new feature and will benefit by making some of the recipes that will be featured in future issues.

White Chocolate Bread Pudding

- 16 slices of White bread (you can use hot dog buns) 3 large beaten eggs 2 cups of sugar 1 quart milk or 4 cups 1 stick margarine, melted 1 tsp. vanilla
- Sauce: I stick margarine 1-6 oz. bag white chocolate chips 1 cup confectioner sugar 1/2 tsp vanilla 6 tsp water

Break bread into pieces and put in a greased 9 by 13 baking dish. Mix eggs, sugar, milk, melted margarine and vanilla. Pour over bread pieces. Bake at 350 degrees for 1 hour.

Melt 1 stick of margarine and white chocolate chips in microwave. Stir until creamy. Add confectioner sugar, vanilla and water. Mix well until smooth. Pour over the pudding about 5-10 minutes before done and place back in oven. This can be garnished with 1 Tablespoon of Cool whip on top of each serving.

(Note: I like lots of sauce on top so I double the sauce recipe. mjf)
